Reflecting on a Year of Challenges & Successes

Over the past year, our students, staff, families, and community members experienced so much. Although many experiences have challenged us, it is humbling to look back at the events of the past year and see the great work that has been done. Students have mastered skills they may not have otherwise, teachers and staff have learned how to engage students in new formats, and community members have dedicated themselves to keeping each other safe.

While none of it has been easy or preferable, we are grateful for the endless support parents have shown their schools as procedures and schedules changed to abide by state requirements, the thousands of extra hours our teachers and staff put in to help every student find success in a strange time, and the countless decisions neighbors have made to help stop the spread of COVID-19 in our community.

Because of our school community and our Inver Grove Heights neighbors, the Class of 2021 is likely to have an in-person graduation ceremony, an exciting prospect after 2020 graduations were required to be virtual. Despite a recent increase in COVID-19 cases, we are seeing Dakota County's case rate begin to decrease again with a combination of free COVID-19 testing, vaccine availability, and health and safety strategies.

Anyone interested in getting a COVID-19 vaccine can now find one at mn.gov/covid19/vaccine, Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) Vaccine Connector. However, frequent COVID-19 testing is still the best way to keep schools and sports open and to make sure special events

like graduations can still be held in-person. We encourage every family to get tested frequently because anyone can have COVID-19 and not have symptoms. MDH recommends that:

- children and teens who spend time around people outside of their household, such as students attending in-person classes, get tested every two weeks through the end of the school year.
- children and teens involved in any after-school activities or sports get tested every week.
- families get tested on the same schedule as their children.

Getting tested is free. Families can do so through their healthcare provider or visit **mn.gov/covid19** and click "Get Tested" to find a community testing site or order an at-home test.

We are so close to the end of the school year and so close celebrating many milestones together. Our community has done an outstanding job and committed tremendous effort to reducing transmission. We don't know what next school year will bring, but with your help, we could have a better chance of returning students to a more familiar routine. Thank you for continuing to follow health and safety best practices to help everyone get back to more of the activities we love!



Simley EMS Students Simulate Disaster for College Paramedic Students



Simley High School's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) classes routinely do drills to practice their skills in high-stress environments that simulate real life. In past years, EMS students have practiced CPR in the middle of the high

school's foyer during a passing period to get used to focusing in a chaotic setting. This spring, EMS students played the victims in a large-scale Mass Casualty Incident simulation to help paramedic students at Inver Hills Community College practice their skills.

Simley students were put in makeup to simulate different injuries and positioned around a parking lot to mimic a car crash. College

students triaged the Simley students, treated their "injuries," put them on gurneys and in the backs of ambulances, and ran through all of the other tasks they would have to do at the scene of a car crash. Although Simley students were acting as the victims, they left with a better understanding of how medical services work at a large-scale incident, what victims experience, and how different severe injuries are treated at the scene. Participating in the simulation also provided them with first-hand knowledge of the educational opportunities that will be available after they complete their high school EMS courses.

Thank you to Inver Hills for inviting Simley students to participate and learn, and thank you to all of the current and future emergency services professionals who work hard to save lives and help our community through disasters.

Budget Situation & Challenges for the Upcoming 2021-2022 School Year

The COVID-19 pandemic has challenged everyone in many ways. The main challenge for school districts this year has been enrollment numbers. Districts across the state and country have had far lower enrollment numbers than expected due to the pandemic. As the school year approached with so many unknowns, families had to make decisions for their children based on the information they had. A number of families chose to keep their kindergarten children home for another year in hopes that the next school year would be more typical. Some opted to homeschool because it would work better for their family's situation while others took a chance on online academies. School districts use enrollment numbers to formulate their budget, determine the number of teachers and support staff they need, and plan for almost every other aspect of the school year. Like a majority of the school districts across the U.S., ISD 199 found its budget in a challenging position because of the unpredictable enrollment changes caused by the pandemic.

Every school year, ISD 199 "right-sizes" its staffing based on anticipated enrollment changes, whether enrollment increases, decreases, or fluctuates at certain grade levels. The process adjusts staffing to meet the needs of all students while bringing the district's budget in line with its revenue. Initial projections for the 2021-2022 school year, which assumed a 1% increase in general education revenue from the state, showed a \$2 million deficit. Right-sizing staffing levels will decrease the deficit by about half, or about \$1 million in expenditures. Additional

adjustments outside of staffing will still need to be considered, along with the use of the district's unassigned fund balance, to create a balanced budget for 2021-2022.

The state and the federal government have allocated short-term funds to school districts to help them deal with the impacts of the pandemic. However, all of the funds allocated for districts come with restrictions and timelines. Funds that have been allocated up until this point have gone toward expenses the district has already incurred to make sweeping changes to keep students learning and implement new health and safety changes in the face of COVID-19. New allocations will require significant planning to make sure ISD 199 is using funds most effectively, meeting all of the restrictions, and not creating new expenditures that the district will not be able to sustain when pandemic relief funding ends.

ISD 199's budget is lacking for the next school year, even with short-term additional funding from the state and the federal government. ISD 199's base budget continues to suffer because state funding for education has not kept pace with inflation since 2003. If it had, the deficit would be more manageable and the district would be able to make more minimal changes to balance its budget. Thank you to the ISD 199 community for its support of the district's 2017 referendum. Without it, the situation would have been even more dire, causing an even larger deficit and a loss of student opportunities.

ISD 199 Earns Certificate of Excellence for 16th Year in a Row

Each year, Inver Grove Heights Schools submits its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report to the Association of School Business Officials (ASBO) International. The submission puts the district in the running for the organization's Certificate of Excellence (COE) in Financial Reporting. This year, ISD 199 earned its 16th Certificate of Excellence in a row for the fiscal year ending in 2020.

"The COE's mission is to promote and recognize excellence in financial reporting," ASBO International Executive Director David Lewis said. "By participating in the COE program, school districts demonstrate their commitment to financial transparency."

Before ISD 199 was chosen to receive the certificate, a team of professional auditors reviewed the district's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and ensured that the district had used the feedback ASBO International provided in their submission from the previous year. The ASBO International auditors provide feedback on all submissions so districts can increase the quality of their reporting and their transparency. The COE in Financial Reporting confirms that the district is supporting student achievement with the most effective resource management, and it helps the district continually improve its accountability each year.

ISD 199 Elementary Students Take the Kids Heart Challenge



Inver Grove Heights Schools elementary students learned about heart health, got active, and raised funds this spring as part of the Kids Heart Challenge. The challenge, formerly known as Jump Rope for Heart, is a program

of the American Heart Association (AHA) that encourages students to practice healthy habits and help other kids overcome heart conditions. Each year, ISD 199 students raise thousands of dollars to help the AHA reduce the number of heart disease and stroke victims while students discover new and fun ways to jump rope.

This year, students spaced out in gym class to safely jump rope and raise funds. They showed each other tricks and created new ways to jump rope. Students at Salem Hills Elementary School and in the Atheneum

Gifted Magnet Program raised enough to be able to slime physical education teacher Mr. DeShaw! One student was randomly picked to dump the slime while classes watched over Zoom.

Pine Bend Elementary School has participated in the AHA's programs for more than 30 years. Their fundraising has earned the school a spot as one of the Top 5 participants in the state and one of the Top 20 in the nation. In addition to the Kids Heart Challenge, more than half of the students at Pine Bend pledged to take Finn's Challenge. The challenge is inspired by Finn, a 6-year-old boy born with multiple heart defects who spent the first eight months of his life in the hospital and is now living a full life. Students who take the challenge strive to drink more water, get active more often, and do more acts of kindness for a healthier life.

Great job to the students on their hard work to improve their lives and those of others through the Kids Heart Challenge and the AHA!

Simley Junior Qualifies for U.S. Women's Open

Simley Girls Golf Team junior captain Isabella McCauley played 36 holes on May 3 in a regional qualifier for the 2021 U.S. Women's Open Championship. Her competitors were some of the best players locally and internationally. Among the players vying for one of the top two spots were many Division 1 college golfers, the current BIG 10 individual champion, and several LPGA tour veterans.

McCauley started her day rolling in 3 birdies on the first 9 holes. A steady back nine closed out her 1-under par opening round of 71 and put her in a great position starting round two. The second round really took off on the 12th hole when she holed out for eagle from 52 yards away! McCauley added birdies on the 15th and 17th holes to put her in 2nd place alone.

After steadying herself on the 18th green, McCauley rolled in an 8-foot sliding putt to save par and earn herself entry into the 2021 U.S. Women's Open! She will compete at the Olympic Golf Club in San Francisco June 3-6. Congratulations, Bella!

Simley Senior Breaks Record for 200 Meter Dash



At a Mahtomedi High School meet, Simley High School senior captain Kate Carlson broke Simley's 200 meter dash school record with a time of 26.25. The previous school record of 26.49 was set by Rachel Anderson in 2018. Kate is also a part of the 4x100 meter relay school record of 49.08 that was set in 2019 and has the 3rd fastest time in Simley history in the 100 meter dash, 12.87.

Kate has overcome a lot in her Simley track career, including knee surgery and her junior season being canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Her determination is clear as she has worked hard throughout the season to better her school record in both the 200 meter dash and the 100 meter dash. Congratulations, Kate!

IGHMS Students Organize Panel of College Students & Professionals



The Inver Grove Heights Middle School Students of Color Leadership Club recently hosted a College and Professional Panel on Zoom to answer student questions. The panel included staff, students, and graduates from multiple local colleges as well as professionals from around Minnesota. Students asked them about their experiences being the first in their family to attend college, what advice they would give to their younger selves, what resources and supports are available to college students, and how they chose their current college or career.

Panelists provided information about scholarships, career centers, where to get help for classes and their job search, and what classes would be available to them once they entered college. Students left with valuable information about resources they could use now, during college, and after college. Panelists also provided helpful tips for successfully navigating college based on their personal experience.

Pine Bend Continues Tradition in New Format



This fall, Pine Bend Elementary School collected donations for a local food shelf, Neighbors Inc. The non-profit social services organization offers emergency and supportive services to northern Dakota County residents. Students gathered 682 pounds of donated

food for Neighbors Inc. The annual donation drive not only helps stock the local pantry for winter, it also leads into a Pine Bend tradition: the school's annual Pig Race.

Classes are allowed to enter one electronic pig in the race for every 50 pounds of food they donate. Pig handlers are chosen from each class to start up their class's pig at the race's starting line and release it once the race begins. Pine Bend students typically gather in the gym to watch. To abide by health and safety measures this year, pig handlers brought their class's pig to the gym to race while classes watched and cheered on their pig over Zoom.

This year, two pigs tied: one from Ms. Empey's class and one from Ms. Gagne's class. Each class won an ice cream party as their prize. Great job to all of the students who donated food to help their neighbors, and congratulations to the Pig Race winners!

WordMasters Students Earn Outstanding Scores

The WordMasters ChallengeTM is a national vocabulary competition based on solving analogies above grade level. Inver Grove Heights Schools students from the Atheneum Gifted Magnet Program and Pine Bend Elementary School earned outstanding scores at the second of three WordMasters ChallengeTM meets this year.

The district's 3rd-grade team scored an impressive 177 points out of 200 in the last meet, achieving Highest Honors and placing 7th in the nation. Competing in the Blue Division of the WordMasters Challenge™, 3rd graders Hayley Chatleain, Tyler Olson, and Mila Sarver, and 4th grader Braxton Rodriguez each earned a perfect score of 20 on the challenge. Only 17 3rd graders and 37 4th graders in the country earned perfect scores.

In the more difficult Gold Division, Finn Christman was one of only 101 4th graders in the nation to achieve a perfect score. Thomas Gaisbauer, a 3rd grader in the Blue Division; Annika Ericson, a 4th grader in the Gold Division; and Alexis To, a 5th grader in the Gold Division all earned high scores in the last meet as well.

Congratulations to all of the students who competed in the most recent WordMasters Challenge[™] and who earned such high scores against nearly 125,000 competitors nationwide!

Simley Hockey, Soccer, & Track Athlete Chosen for Athena Award



Simley High School senior Zoe Boughton has been selected as the Athena Female Athlete of the Year for 2021. Head coaches from Simley chose Zoe based on her outstanding accomplishments in hockey, soccer, and track and in the classroom.

"She is a 4.0 student and a great leader. ... She has played defense for the majority of her career and has emerged as one of the hardest defenders to beat in the Metro East Conference, if not the hardest," Simley Girls Hockey Coach Tom Patnode said. "Zoe is a game changer for our team when she is on the rink."

Zoe, the 2020-2021 team captain, is a 5-year letter winner in hockey. She maintains a full schedule of rigorous classes and her three sports. She has earned All Conference and All Conference Honorable Mentions, she is a 5-year letter winner and 4-year Academic Award winner for her 4.0 GPA, and she is part of the All-State 2nd Team.

"She is a strong leader on and off the field and a great role model for the younger soccer girls in our program," Ms. Austin said.

Zoe is a letter winner in track as well. Despite her junior year track season being canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, she has made her mark on Simley history. She maintains the 7th fastest 100 meter dash and 8th fastest 200 meter dash in school history, and she has broken the school record for the 4x100 meter relay twice. In the 4x100 meter relay, she has also been named Conference Champion twice, she has been Sections Champion and Runner-up, and she has been a state participant in the event twice, earning 8th place her freshman year and 6th place her sophomore year. There is more on the horizon for her senior year of track.

Zoe has earned a spot as a Top Simley Senior for the Class of 2021 as well. She plans to play soccer at Northern State University in South Dakota next year. Congratulations, Zoe!


