# EL SALVADOR

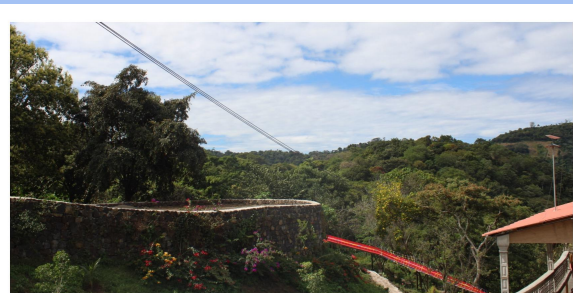

# THE MOST NOTORIOUS SERIAL KILLER

There have been many serial killers in history. Some are more deadly and popular than others. This is a list of the most notorious serial killers in history:

Number five is Harold Shipman. He was a doctor and was known for killing his patients. He killed over 250 people between 1972 and 1998, mostly older women. He was also known as Dr. Death. People started to be suspicious of him when they noticed how many death certificates involved him. When police started investigating, they mishandled the investigation, and Shipman continued killing. Eventually, Shipman got greedy and tried to forge a will from one of the patients that he killed. The family of that patient became suspicious and reported Shipman to the police. He was finally convicted in 2000 and died in prison in 2004.

Number four is John Wayne Gacy,

also known as the killer clown. He got that nickname because he was a clown at children's birthday parties. Gacy showed up on the radar when a 15-year-old boy went missing after he was last seen with Gacy. Other families pointed fingers at Gacy when they had a missing young boy, but this was the first time authorities took the accusations seriously. Not long after that police got a search warrant for Gacy's house and right away they were hit with a decaying body smell. They found nearly 30 bodies in a 4-foot crawl space. Gacy was convicted of 33 murder counts and additional charges of torture. He was executed by lethal injection in 1994.

Number three is H. H. Holmes. He moved to Chicago to turn a hotel into a torture castle. Holmes built a bunch of mechanisms into his hotel to use criminally including, gas lines, secret passages, trapdoors, hallways to dead ends, chutes to the basement, soundproofed padding, and torture devices strewn throughout a maze. The gas allowed Holmes to knock out his guests before the worst of what was to happen came, often on his surgical tables. He burned the bodies in the building's furnace and sold the skeletons to medical schools. Holmes was also running life insurance scams. In all, Holmes committed more than 30 murders. His crimes were

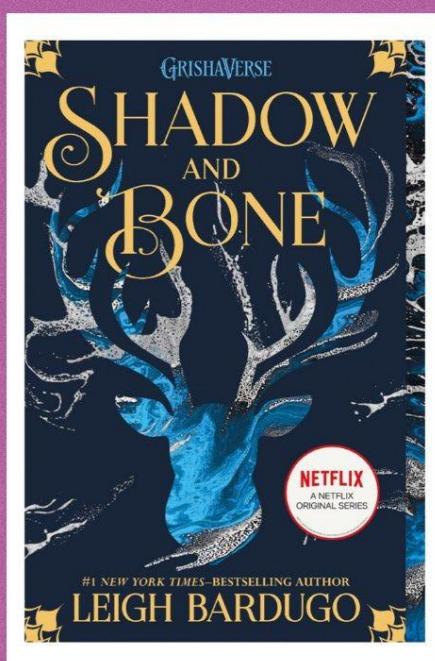
discovered only after a fellow scammer turned him in for not following through on a financial agreement. Holmes was hanged in 1896.

Number two is Pedro Lopez. Lopez is linked to more than 300 murders in Colombia, Ecuador and Peru. After Lopez's arrest in 1980, police found the graves of more than 50 of his preteen victims. He was later convicted of murdering 110 girls in Ecuador and confessed to 240 more murders in Colombia and Peru. The "Monster of the Andes" didn't even spend 20 years in prison, as he was released in 1998 for good behavior. His current whereabouts remain unknown.

Number one is Ted Bundy. You probably already know about him but in case you've lived under a rock, Ted Bundy was a serial killer that targeted college-aged women from Washington and Oregon to Utah and Colorado. Bundy was once arrested in Colorado and convicted of kidnapping, but he escaped custody, moving to Florida where he killed multiple times more. When he was finally caught, his trial caught the attention of a lot of people because he acted as his own lawyer throughout the whole trial. It was the first televised murder trial. He was eventually executed in 1989 by the electric chair.
